# Connect with Council Open House

#### Place: Devon Community Centre

Last fall, Devon Council held its first Community Open House where they shared some of the initiatives they were working on since being elected in 2017 and what they were hoping to achieve in 2019. Continuing with their commitment to communicating with residents, Council would like to invite Devon residents, businesses and other interested parties to join them for their 2019 Connect with Council Open House.

Open House attendees will be treated to a short 15-20 minute presentation by members of Council highlighting some of the Town's achievements in 2019 as well as a brief look into what they hope to achieve moving into 2020. Following the presentation there will be a moderated group Q & A session where attendees will be able to submit their questions to be answered by Council.

## Town Launches Kitchen Catcher Program for Residents

As a part of the Town's continued commitment to exploring ways for Devon to reduce its environmental footprint, **the Town** of Devon is now offering kitchen catchers to Devon residents at no charge to help decrease the amount of food waste being sent to our landfill.

Devon residents are encouraged to pick up their kitchen catcher at the Town of Devon Office (limit 1 per household).

#### Why Kitchen Catchers?

According to a waste audit conducted in 2018, about 34 per cent of the contents of the average residents' black garbage cart was composed of organic waste. Having a kitchen catcher readily available encourages residents to toss their food scraps or other household organic waste into it to be properly disposed of in their green organics cart.

#### **Devon Council Appoints Single-Use Waste Reduction Task Force**

With all the changes to the waste and recycling industry this past year, the Town has been exploring new ideas to help reduce its waste footprint and become a more sustainable community. To assist with this, Devon Council is looking to the community for input and is proud to announce the appointment of its Single-Use Waste Reduction Task Force. The Task Force is comprised of five Devon residents, one member of Devon Council and the Town's Environment and Sustainability Coordinator and will meet monthly until Council deems their task completed. The mandate for the Task Force is to assist the Town with community engagement and the development of a strategy for eliminating single-use retail plastic bags from distribution in Devon, while exploring additional opportunities for reducing Devon's waste that the Town should consider moving forward.

Since the start of Devon's Indigenous Engagement Initiative in May, the Town has been busy putting together cultural awareness events as well as new opportunities for Devon residents and visitors to learn about First Nations and Métis culture.

## Some of the indigenous events the Town has hosted this summer include:

- Presentation by Rocky Ward of Native Counselling Services of Alberta on the impacts of the residential school system in Canada
- A community film viewing of Treaty Talks: Sharing the River of Life
- Two presentations/workshops by Michif Cultural Connection of St. Albert that shared information about Métis culture, language and history and the art of finger weaving
- A medicine bag and beading workshop by Jo Swampy of Maskwacis
- Elder Philip Campious joined the EPCOR RiverFest event for a river blessing and tipi set up
- Sixties Scoop Indigenous Society of Alberta brought their national exhibit Bi-Giwen: Coming Home Truth Telling from the Sixties Scoop to the Devon Community Centre

Another program scheduled to launch later this fall is called Residents for Reconciliation. This program will provide an opportunity for residents to get together and learn more about indigenous culture and reconciliation.

Indigenous engagement and reconciliation remains a top priority for Devon as the Town remains fully committed to working with Treaty Six Nations and their members to continue down the path of reconciliation in a genuine and holistic manner.

## Devon FCSS Launches 28-day Family FUN-O Challenge

Devon FCSS is launching its first ever Family FUN-O Challenge to encourage Devon families to spend quality time together with a game of UNO each day! The challenge starts on Oct. 1 and will run until Nov. 30.

#### The Challenge

To participate in the Family FUN-O Challenge, families will be required to play UNO for 10-25 minutes each day for 28 days. Challengers do not need to complete all the days in a row and can space them out as needed throughout the Oct. 1 – Nov. 30 timeline.



The term family is used loosely for the challenge and at a minimum may consist of one person over 18 and one person under 18 participating in the household. Those without UNO cards are invited to drop by the Town of Devon Office at #1 Columbia Ave. West to pick up a free pack of cards and game sheet.

Families that complete the challenge and submit their game sheet will be entered into a **grand prize draw**

Emphasize promotion of Town related information through social media as it is low cost and has proven to be effective

Complete a visual overhaul of the Town of Devon website to increase accessibility

Consider launching an email list that residents can subscribe to for bi-weekly updates on programs and initiatives from the Town

### New Phone Number for Community Peace Officer Complaints

The Town of Devon has signed on with the Yellowhead County

Regional Emergency Communications Centre (YRECC) to provide dispatching services for the Town's Community Peace Officers (CPOs). The new dispatching centre provides Devon residents with a more efficient process to register complaints to the Town's CPOs while also offering a new level of safety for the Peace Officers.

Residents looking to register complaints to Devon's CPOs are now invited to call **825-316-2008** to submit a complaint. **This number is toll free and answered 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.** To ensure no complaints are missed during the transition, the existing Peace Officer complaint line is being forwarded to the dispatch Centre.
